Minutes of the November 2, 1988 Membership Meeting

Meeting was called to order by R.E. John Sheridan at 7:40 P.M. 23 members present.

Secretary's Report - A motion was made by Harold Cameron and seconded by Steve Hassett to accept the minutes from the September membership meeting as they appeared in the Knock-Off. Motion was carried.

Treasurer's Report - was read by Jim Bishop. Jim indicated that the Silver Mines Race was a financial success. A motion was made by Jack Hanifan, seconded by Harold Cameron to accept the treasurer's report as read. Motion carried.

Membership Committee - Mike Weir reported the total membership is at 232, up from 200 earlier this year.

Editor's Report - Sally Handy requests members to send her articles for the Knock-Off.

Publisher's Report - George Smith reports the publishing process is going very well and costs are at a minimum. He congratulated Sally Handy on her quickness to adapt to the editor's duties and how well she is doing.

Competition Committee - Jack Hanifan reports that all log book problems from the Silver Mines have been addressed. Competition for the year is over. The NARRC Run-offs were not blessed with the best of weather. Many competitors were not allowed to run because of lack of rain tires.

Old Business - John Sheridan said the Silver Mines Race report from the special meeting will appear in this issue of the Knock-Off. Many problems were discussed and possible solutions. John also stated that there may have been a possible settlement in the lawsuit from the 1985 Silver Mines RAce. The Executive Board has recommended some changes and will entertain discussion on the By-Laws changes. A list of recommendations will appear in the Knock-Off.

Nominating Committee - Jack Hanifan presented the slate of officers for 1989. All positions were unopposed and a motion was made by Jack Hanifan, seconded by Harold Cameron to have the secretary cast one ballot for the slate of officers. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Jack Hanifan and seconded by Mike Weir to authorize this payment to NARRC. Motion carried.

Dave McClumpha reported that the By-Laws changes will be ready for voting at the January meeting.

Motion to adjourn by Dave McClumpha and seconded by Jon Handy. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 8:50. Video tapes followed.

1988 NEDIV CONVENTION REPORT by John C. Sheridan

On the 18, 19 and 20 of November, Jim Bishop and I represented Mo Hud at the annual NEDIV Convention. This year's event was hosted by the Susquehana Region in Hershey, Pennsylvania. The event was well attended with over 140 SCCA members present. The following is a brief synopsis of the seminars I participated in. If anyone has any questions please feel free to call.

Scheduling

The Mohawk Hudson Region Race is on the proposed calendar of events for Saturday September 23, 1989. At present it is scheduled as both a NARRC and NYSRCC event. The only real scheduling problem is that of the perennial back to back national races we are famous for in the Northeast. A tentative NEDIV schedule is printed elsewhere in the K.O.

Timing and Scoring - Sue Conklin

The new Divisional Administrator is Carla Heath. Effective January 1, 1989, Carla should be contacted for license upgrades.

The advantages and disadvantages of automated T & S were discussed and it was generally agreed that a) Time cards have to be done as a backup, b) it takes a minimum of 30 hours of training on software to approach proficiency with computer systems, and c) the advent of computerized T & S requires a new subspecialty, T & S auditing. There are a lot of knowledgeable people out there willing to help us if called upon.

Registration - Lois Hauser

Effective January 1, 1989 SCCA will require that members have photo licenses, i.e., one of our SCCA licenses will contain a photograph. It will be the responsibility of each region to provide their own members with the means to obtain these licenses. Many regions are providing their workers with free photo licenses (A real good idea).

Minor waivers were reviewed at length, they must be signed by both parents. The original will be kept by the first region to admit the minor. At subsequent events a photocopy may be submitted of the original.

MEMORANDUM

TO: General Membership

FROM: John C. Sheridan

RE: The 1988 Silver Mines Post Mortem

On October 22, 1988 a Post Mortem was held to analyze the weaknesses of the 1988 race effort. The meeting was attended by alaamost all our chiefs of specialty and sever significant others. It was chaired by Tom Campbell who led us through a group problem solving exercise. Under Tom's guidance, we identified our problems; listed, sorted and prioritized them; identified potential causes and solutions; reviewed the proposed solutions, and discussed their implementation. It is this last area which will require your continued input and assistance if we are to make the 1989 Race a success.

Recognizing that I cannot do the meeting justice, I will briefly recount the four problems and solutions we spent the bulk of our time addressing.

1. Over-subscribed Race Groups

Exacerbating any operational problems, we may have had was the large turnout of 305 cars. This large entry coupled with an extremely large turnout in several classes and poor planning of race groups resulted in some groups having the potential for 50+ cars.

The possible solutions identified included consideration of a two day event, increasing the number of race groups, locking in to 8 race groups, developing a category to be called "provisional entrant". That is to say if the individual enters after the maximum number of cars for their group has been registered and/or they are a late entrant. Provisional entrants will not be guaranteed they will get on the track.

Timing and Scoring Difficulties

It was universally agreed that in spite of a significant improvement in the number of staff and upgrading of equipment that there were serious deficiencies in the Timing and Scoring of the days event, i.e. Inaccurate Grids, Entrants without Qualifying Times and Late Race results.

The causes of this outcome were identified as not enough T/S workers, inexperience with our software, significant loss of time due to reorganization of the race groups, equipment problems resulting from the environment in which the equipment was utilized, insufficient hardware, poor communication with the drivers, duplicate numbers, unreadable numbers, interruptions by entrants, missed cars and inaccurate input.

Possible solutions include; attracting more workers, obtaining more equipment, set up of the equipment in a more protected environment, more time to set up data, appoint an ombudsman, and set up of an entrant information center across the paddock.

Too Many Cars on the Track

One episode in which there were too many cars on the track resulted in a significant loss of time. Possible causes of this were identified as inaccurate grid sheets, too many entrants without a time, failure to count and grid to tower communications difficulties.

Among the solutions discussed were: provision of accurate grids, improving communications with drivers, under take more accurate counting by grid people, assertion of control function by grid people, closer monitoring by operating stewards and improvement in communication between the grid and the operating stewards.

4. Communications Problems

Compounding our difficulties were communications difficulties with the race committee/organization and with the competitors. The probable causes were determined to be insufficient numbers of radios, equipment failures, equipment turned off, inadequate public address system, unresponsive drivers.

The possible solutions include pre-race meetings, training on equipment, additional equipment, a channel for operations and one administration.

of the

MOHAWK-HUDSON REGION SPORTS CAR CLUB OF AMERICA, INC.

Revised October, 1988

ARTICLE I

The Club

- Section 1. The name of the Club shall be the Mohawk-Hudson Region, Sports Car Club of America, Inc., hereinafter called The Club.
- Section 2. The general purpose of the Club shall be to encourage the ownership and operation of Sports Cars; to provide and regulate events and exhibitions for Sports Cars and their owners; sponsor and promote competition events; act as a source of technical information; establish rules and regulations covering all activities of Club; encourage safe, careful and skillful driving on the public highways; enter into contractual agreements, purchase, sell mortgage, lease real and personal property, as incidental to the foregoing purposes.

ARTICLE II

Officers

- Section 1. The elected officers of the Club shall be a Regional Executive, two (2) Directors-at-Large, an Assistant Regional Executive, Secretary, Treasurer, and Activities Director. They shall each serve for one year, or until their successors are qualified and elected. they shall constitute the Board of Directors hereinafter called the Board. The Directors-at-Large shall have previously held an elective office.
- Section 2. In case a vacancy shall occur in any of said offices, a majority of the Board of Directors shall select a qualified member in good standing to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting.
- Section 3. The Board shall be responsible for all operations and activities of the Club and shall be guided by the following priorities, in the order listed:

- A. National Constitution, By-Laws and Policy
- B. SCCA Operations Manual
- C. Mohawk-Hudson Region Constitution and By-Laws
- D. Majority vote of the members present and voting at a duly constituted meeting of the members.
- E. Majority vote of the Board.
- F. Majority vote of appointed Committee.
- Section 4.

The Board shall appoint a nominating committee consisting of no less than three members in good standing of the Club who shall present a slate of nominees at the regular [October] November meeting. Any ten (10) members in good standing may nominate a member in good standing, as a candidate for office. Such nomination must be made in writing, signed by the members making the nomination, countersigned by the member so nominated signifying his willingness to accept the candidacy and delivered to the Secretary [no later than] at the regular November meeting. Nominees for Director-at-Large must have previously served in an elective capacity. The Secretary shall prepare a ballot containing the names of all persons nominated. The Secretary shall mail said ballot to each member in good standing with notice of the annual meeting, under the provisions of Article V, Section 4. of these by-laws.

ARTICLE III

Duties of Officers

Section 1.

The Regional Executive shall preside at all meetings of the members and officers and shall perform the duties usually appertaining to this office. He may call special meetings of members under the provisions of Article V, Section 3. He shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Club. [He shall appoint Administrative Directors and Committees as necessary, subject to approval of a majority of the Board.]

In addition he shall:

- A. Appoint Administrative Chairmen and committees as necessary, subject to approval of a majority of the Board.
- B. Act for the Treasurer when the need arises. He shall give bond, at the Club's expense.

C. Appoint an audit committee each year to review the Club's financial records. This committee will report it's findings to the Board one month after receiving the annual financial report prepared by the Treasurer.

In the absence of the Regional Executive, or in the case of his death, resignation, or inability to act, the duties usually appertaining to that office shall be performed by the Assistant Regional Executive.

Section 2.

The Assistant Regional Executive shall assist the Regional Executive in the performance of any of the executive duties as the Regional Executive may delegate. In the absence of the Regional Executive from regular or Board meetings, the Assistant Regional Executive shall perform the normal duties of the Regional Executive. The Assistant Regional Executive is responsible for the inventory and management of all Club property.

Section 3.

The Secretary, or designated representative, shall attend all meetings of the members and Board and shall record all minutes and votes. In addition, the secretary shall:

- A. Maintain a current membership list.
- B. Give notice of all meetings of the members or Board as required by law and this Constitution.
- C. Perform all duties incident to the office, or as required by law or the Board.
- D. Maintain a current copy of the constitution and by-laws.
- Section 4.

The Treasurer shall have custody of all monies, debts, obligations belonging to the Club. He shall make all payments of the Club's debts. He shall collect Regional Club dues as required by National Policy. All contracts, checks, drafts, notes or other orders for payment or money shall be signed in the name of the Club by the Treasurer [and countersigned] or, in his absence, by the Regional Executive subject to such other conditions and requirements as appear elsewhere in this Constitution. He shall give bond, at Club expense[, if required by the Board].

The Treasurer shall give a report on the financial status of the Club at all Regular meetings, and if so requested, at any other meeting. A majority of the Board of Directors may appoint an Assistant Treasurer to act in the absence or incapacity of the Treasurer.

The Treasurer shall submit an annual financial [statement] report to the Board no later than [December 31st] January 31st, of [each] the following year. This statement should indicate the overall financial status of the Club and the relative contribution of each major area of Club activity to that status, including administrative and other expenses and income.

- Section 5.
- The Board shall submit, for membership approval, a proposed annual budget for the ensuing year no later than the Regular February meeting.
- Section 6.
- No obligation, debt, or other liability shall be incurred by any officer or member without the specific prior approval of a majority of the Board, with the exception of Event Chairpersons while operating within previously approved budgets.
- Section 7.
- It shall be the duty of the Activities director to arrange all events for the year as specified under Article I, Section I, Section2., of this Constitution. The Activities Director shall submit to the members a tentative schedule for the ensuing year at the regular February meeting and keep the members advised as to events of other local Sport Car Clubs and any changes in the schedule. The Activities Director shall maintain and make available, a permanent file of all event instructions, course maps, route instructions, event general and supplemental regulations and car classifications.
- Section 8.
- There shall be a Regional Protest Board consisting of the Activities Director and both Directors-at-Large who shall resolve all protests lodged by competitors in any event except where otherwise provided in event or other regulations [not covered by National Regulations]. Decisions of the Protest Board shall be final. In case one or more of the above named is directly involved in such a protest, they shall be replaced by the Regional Executive, Assistant Regional Executive, Secretary, Treasurer, in that order.
- Section 9.
- The Competition [Director] Chairman, [if] appointed by the Regional Executive, shall act as Liaison between the Competition Board of SCCA, Inc. and the Region and its members. He shall be responsible for enforcing all Competition Regulations SCCA, Inc. within the Region. He will approve competition drivers in accordance with the SCCA, Inc. regulations. He will keep the members of the Region informed of changes in Competion Regulations, procedures, schedules of Driver's Schools, Races, and any other matters which pertain to the Competition Program of SCCA, Inc.

Membership and Dues

- Section 1.

 Columbia, Washington, Warren, Hamilton, Essex,
 Franklin, and Clinton] Albany, Clinton, Columbia,
 Essex, Franklin, Fulton, Greene, Hamilton,
 Montgomery, Rensselaer, Saratoga, Schenectady,
 Schoharie, Warren, and Washington of the State of
 New York, shall ordinarily constitute the members
 of the Club.
- New members: Applications for membership in the Mohawk-Hudson Region, Sports Car Club of America, Inc., and the Sports Car Club of America, Inc., shall be forwarded to [any officer of the Region for approval by the Regional Executive, and upon payment of such annual dues and fees as may be required, and upon approval by] the National Office of the Sports Car Club of America, Inc., for processing. [the] The applicant shall be considered a member in good standing upon receipt of the application and annual dues by the National Office.
- Section 3. The annual Regional Club Dues may be changed only by a majority of the members present and voting at a meeting, the purpose of such meeting having been announced in the Club's publication at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting, and any change in dues shall take effect in accordance with National Policy.
- Section 4. Membership in the [Region[Club will automatically lapse for non-payment of dues [concurrently] concurrent with National deadlines.
- Section 5. Any member may be suspended until the next Regular meeting for infraction of Club rules by vote of a majority of the Board, or for other cause if a majority of the Board shall deem such suspension to be in the best interest of the Club. Upon such suspension, the member shall be so informed in writing, and shall be given a reasonable opportunity to be heard thereon before the Board. Any member suspended as provided above shall be presented at the next regular meeting for expulsion and shall be expelled if the majority of the members present and voting, vote to expel him or her. the majority of the members present and voting do not vote expulsion, the member shall automatically and immediately be re-instated as a member in good standing. The vote shall be by secret ballot.

ARTICLE IV, cont'd

Section 6. Any member may resign by directing a letter of resignation to the Secretary. His [re ignation] resignation shall be effective on receipt, provided all indebtedness to the Club is paid.

ARTICLE V

Meetings of the Members

Section 1. The annual meeting of the Region shall be held at the regular meeting in December of each year for the election of officers, and such other business as lawfully may come before the meeting.

A written notice, stating the place, day, hour, and purpose of the annual meeting or any special meeting of the Region shall be given by the Secretary not less than seven days nor more than thirty (30) days before such meeting to each member by mailing, first class, to the address appearing on the Club's Roster, said notice.

- [Section 2. Regular meetings shall be held on the first Wednesday of each month unless otherwise stated.]
- Section [3]2. Other meetings of the Members or Board may be called by the Regional Executive or by a majority of the Board.
- [Section 4. A written notice, stating the place, day, hour, and purpose of the annual meeting or any special meeting of the Region shall be given by the Secretary not less than seven days nor more than thirty (30) days before such meeting to each member by mailing, first class, to the address appearing on the Club's Roster, said notice.]
- Section [5]3. Board meetings shall be scheduled by the Regional Executive. All actions taken by the Board shall be entered into the minutes and be presented to the membership [for ratification by a majority vote of the members present and voting] for information at the next regular meeting.
- Section [6]4. All action, except amendment of the Constitution and By-Laws, shall be by a majority vote of those members present and voting. Voting by absentee ballot, except for amendment of the Constitution shall not be allowed, except with approval of the majority of the Board in accordance with the rules they prescribe and with notice to all members.

ARTICLE V, cont'd

Section [7]5. All meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the latest published revision of Roberts Rules of Order.

ARTICLE VI

Amendment of the Constitution and By-Laws

The Board of Directors, or any five memebers in good standing, by written petition submitted to the Secretary, may propose an amendment to the Constitution or By-Laws.

Upon such proposal being made, a copy thereof shall be included in a notice of the next meeting of the members, together with a ballot upon which members may vote for or against said proposal. If two-thirds of the ballots cast favor the proposal, the proposed amendment shall thereby be approved and adopted.

ARTICLE VII

FISCAL YEAR

Section 1. The fiscal year of the Club shall be the Calendar year.

As in the past 25+ years, this event is part of the Pittsfield Winter Carnival and is put on by the Mohawk-Hudson Region of the Sports Car Club of America with large amounts of help from the Berkshire Motor Sports Club (the chairmen are both SCCA and BMSC members).


That's right, it's another busy two days, two events Ice Trials. Classes for any type of 4 wheeled vehicle with any type of tyres. Front engine Rear wheel drive, Front engine Front wheel drive, Rear engine Rear wheel drive, or Four wheel drive. Whatever moves you. If you're in doubt, call me. Jeeps and Dune Buggies must have roll bars or hard tops. All classes are duplicated for studded snow tyres (standard commercial studding). All vehicles MUST have and drivers use SEATBELTS! Helmets must be worn, a few loaner helmets will be available.

While this event is designed for street cars, a special class for modified vehicles also exists. This class is for any vehicle with special equipment such as Ice Racing vehicles, dune buggies, vehicles with locked differentials, and any vehicle with non-standard studs in the tyres (such as longer than normal, more than normal or otherwise different than normal). Cars may be placed in this class at the decision of the chairman or safety inspector. The GREEN MACHINE will have it's own class. An additional fee will be collected from drivers of the GREEN MACHINE to cover expenses. Go-Carts, motorcycles and ATVs are NOT allowed. All vehicles MUST have and drivers use SEATBKLTS!

The Ice Trials consists of a defined course on the surface of the frozen lake. The length of the course will be between 1 and 1.5 miles (depending on snow conditions) and cars will be a minimum of 1 minute apart with a maximum of two vehicles on the course at any time to eliminate any risk of collision. The object of the event is to complete the course in the least amount of time. Runs will be timed to hundreths of a second or better. Penalties will be assessed (time added) for hitting course markers (pylons). Approximately one third of the entries in each vehicle class, as defined above, will be awarded trophies for their performance. A minimum of three cars must enter any class for a trophy to be awarded in that class. Bring your friends to drive your car if it is an oddball. Special classes may be created if a large number of vehicles of any one type enter. This is at the discretion of the event chairman.

REGISTRATION: Saturday and Sunday opens at 9:30 A.M. (along with course familiarization runs) and runs throughout the event. Missed runs will not be made up. First run will start at llam each day. Cars run in numerical order. Entrants may enter more than one vehicle. The different vehicles may be in the same or in different classes. It is the entrant's responsibility to have the cars ready to run in order. More than one driver may enter driving the same vehicle. Numbers will be assigned at least 4 apart to allow for driver changes.

PRE-REGISTRATION: Contact the chairman for entry forms. Fees are \$10.00 per day per entrant.

UP-COMING EVENTS

ICE TRIALS: The Ice Trials in Pittsfield (a Mo-Hud event this year) have a date. February 4th and 5th. Saturday and Sunday. Two days, two separate events. Onota Lake. Plow needed, (ie: Bill Foshay! No snow desired till February 6th! flier was in the November KO or you can contact me for details.

The Green Machine (1970 Chevy station wagon, 350cid V-8, welded differential, 1/4x20 bolts in tyres for studs) is again available to drivers for a user fee of \$5 (for members of SCCA or BMSC) and \$10 (all others). Contact Clark W. Nicholls (413-243-3433) or Mark Majcher (413-243-2790) if you are interested. Donations of 5 bolt Chevy wheels with or without tires and any Chevy 350 parts are needed. Contact same if you can help.

RACE OFFICIAL LICENSING

Yes, I am the person to contact if you need help or information regarding licensing of race workers/officials. SCCA National refers to me as the Regional Administrator, Worker Licensing. Remember, if you wish to work a race you must have a license. If you don't there is what is called a Regional license. It replaces what us old timers remember as a Logbook. Anyone who is a paid up member of SCCA is eligible for one and all you need to do is fill out a simple form. No cost or obligation. My personal feeling is that every SCCA member should get this license JUST IN CASE the urge hits to work a race (you get in free!). SCCA rules state that every worker must be a member AND have a license. Come on, everyone, let's get licensed. Also, even if you don't work any races, this license can be renewed, year after year. After you get into being a worker/official, your license may be upgraded to a Divisional, but to renew on of those you need to work at least 4 SCCA events each year.

There are several 'specialties' for you to choose from, such as Race Control (Grid), Race Control (Pit & Paddock), Flagging and Communication, Starter, Sound Control, Technical Inspection, Emergency Services, Registrar, Timing and Scoring. Choose one or several and get the forms from me. Let's get your license well in advance of the first race of 1989!
